Location

The main campus is 2,425 acres and Innovation Place Research Park is another 500 acres. The University also owns land elsewhere in Saskatoon as well as around Saskatchewan. The total property value of the buildings and their contents is approximately \$2.49 billion (2004).

Celebrated History

The Act establishing the University of Saskatchewan was passed by the Legislative Assembly on April 3, 1907. The U of S will celebrate its 100th birthday in 2007. The first classes in Arts and Science began in 1909 with a registration of 70 students. These classes were held in the Drinkle Building, in downtown Saskatoon. On October 12, 1912 the first building on campus, the College Building, was opened for student admissions. It was declared a provincial (1982) and federal (2000) heritage building.

Colleges and Schools

The University of Saskatchewan offers 58 degrees, diplomas and certificates in over 100 areas and disciplines. Colleges and schools include: Agriculture, Arts and Science, Commerce, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Graduate Studies and Research, Kinesiology, Law, Medicine (includes Physical Therapy), Nursing, Pharmacy and Nutrition, Veterinary Medicine, and Extension Division.

Faculty & Staff

The U of S prides itself on its outstanding and diverse faculty and staff that number about 7,350. The University, with associated organizations like Innovation Place and the Royal University Hospital, is the City of Saskatoon's second largest employer, making up about eight percent of the city's work force.

Research

The U of S attracted over \$107 million in research revenue in 2004-05. The \$173.5-million Canadian Light Source synchrotron project - one of the largest scientific facilities in Canada - opened in October 2004.

Students

The U of S strives to prepare students for the knowledge age. In 2003-04, 15,228 students were enrolled full time in degree courses and 3,854 were enrolled part time.

Budget

The University has an operating budget of \$230.5 million
